The Scriptures

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew 14:15-21

That evening the disciples came to Jesus and said,

"Let the crowds leave, so they can go to the villages and buy some food." Jesus replied, "They don't have to leave. Why don't you give them something to eat?" But they said, "We have only five small loaves of bread and two fish." Jesus asked his disciples to bring the food to him, and he told the crowd to sit down on the grass. Jesus took the five loaves and the two fish. He looked up toward heaven and blessed the food.

Then he broke the bread and handed it to his disciples, and they gave it to the people. After everyone had eaten all they wanted, Jesus' disciples picked up twelve large baskets of leftovers.

There were about five thousand men who ate, not counting the women and children.

In today's gospel reading there is some discord between Jesus and his disciples. Although Jesus had been the one to leave the crowds and seek out a deserted place to mourn John the Baptist, when the crowds find him and interrupts his solitude, instead of irritation or annoyance, "his heart was moved with pity for them." the disciples seem to be the ones who are flustered by this turn of events and so take it upon themselves to tell Jesus when evening falls that it's time to dismiss the crowds, so they can go and buy their own dinners.

The crowd do not seem concerned about physical hunger. Perhaps the hunger Jesus was already filling, the hunger that initially drove them out of their familiar towns and into this deserted place, was deeper than any physical hunger pains could be.

Jesus tells his disciples, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food your-selves." As with all his words and actions, Jesus is mentoring the disciples in what it really means to follow him. Instead of sending people away, they should be inviting them closer. Instead of telling them to go and take care of their own needs, they should feeding them (both spiritually and physically) themselves.

As followers of Christ, we are also the intended recipients of Jesus' words. We are not to hoard the bread of life or the word of God, but instead we are to invite all we meet to come to the feast. We should not be concerned with scarcity. At the table of the Lord, we find abundance and more than enough to satisfy the hunger of all . *Living Liturgy*, 2020

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
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A message from the Archdiocese of Sydney
