Baptism of the Lord

Year B

9th/10th January, 2021

In a nutshell Jesus joins the crowd

at the Jordan where John is baptising.

No one recognises him as anyone special; he is just one of the crowd. John the Baptist tells the people of the One who is to come, who will baptise with the Holy Spirit.

After Jesus' baptism, John's words come to life: the Spirit descends, and God's voice proclaims that Jesus is indeed God's Son.



Today's feast of the Baptism of Our Lord brings to an end the season of Christmas. Coming after the Epiphany of the Lord, it can be seen as a second manifestation of Christ, as the heavens are opened before the whole world.

Through Christ's baptism, in which the entire Trinity is present **(Gospel)**, the world is made into a second creation.

In the **First Reading**, from Isaiah, we hear how God's word will bear fruit in us. The one we see being baptised in the Gospel is the Word and, by carrying out the Father's will perfectly, all creation is restored. This is why we can join with the **Psalmist:** 'With joy we shall draw water from the wells of salvation'!

St John develops this theme (**Second Reading**) when he says that because Jesus overcame the world by water and blood, so we, with the Spirit living in us, can be saved.

This coming week, let's strive to deepen our trust in the Father, who is our salvation; to nurture our faith in the Spirit, who works in us to ensure we do not return empty-handed; and to strengthen our joy in the Son, through whose incarnation and baptism we are made into God's children. Today we welcome many visitors to a special 11am Mass, celebrated by Bishop Terry Brady, commemorating the centenary of the death of Eileen O'Connor, Servant of God, 10th January 1921.


Weekday Masses this coming week are on Tuesdays and Thursday only.

The cause of a person's poverty is not yours to question. The fact a person is poor is the reason you help.'

Eileen O'Connor, known as **'Little Mother'** by the members of the congregation she founded, has long been considered by many to be a **'saint-in-waiting'**. And now, her holiness and virtue have been recognised by the Holy See and the cause for her canonisation opened by the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints.

Born in Melbourne on 20 February 1892, Eileen suffered from a severe curvature of the spine and for much of her



life she could not stand or walk. It is now known Eileen suffered from transverse myelitis, an inflammation of the spinal cord.

With limited education and no formal theological formation, she embodied a distinctive spirituality marked by an unwavering devotion to Our Lady and her willingness to devote her suffering to Our Lady's work.

Starting with a group of seven women in a rented house in Dudley street, Eileen and co-founder, Fr Ted McGrath msc (parish priest) , reached out to the poorest of the poor in Sydney.

Eileen's beautiful spirit inspired many people to seek her guidance and prayers. She listened to them, understood their problems and gave wise advice. There are numerous anecdotal and documented accounts of Eileen's intercession in answering the prayers of the faithful.

Eileen died on 10 January 1921, aged just 28 years. Her body was found to be incorrupt when it was exhumed from Randwick Cemetery for reinterment in the chapel at Our Lady's Home, Coogee, 15 years later.

Eileen's legacy – the mission of Our Lady's Nurses for the Poor over the past 100 years – ranks among the great and enduring social works of Caroline Chisholm and Saint Mary MacKillop.

The sisters aim to give expression to God's unconditional and liberating love in all that they do. Their guiding principle is to espouse the inspired and genuine Christian love demonstrated by their co-founder, Eileen O'Connor.
